Online

Our Alberta accredited education for grades 1 to 12 provides students with the highest quality online education which we deliver in an asynchronous mode. NorthStar Academy has a history of excellent Evangelical Christian Education and has developed our online school to be effective, while ensuring a dynamic learning environment for our students around the world.

Print Based Resource Program

God has given each child unique gifts and with NorthStar's Print Based Resource Program, students learn with education that is tailored to their interests, abilities and needs.

Shared Responsibility (Blended) Program

In this program students do part of their schooling using the online and/or print based resource model and part using a home education (parent-directed) model.

Parent Directed Home Schooling

NorthStar Academy is an education from home specialist and we encourage and support families who desire to meet the individual needs and abilities of their children through traditional home schooling.



Plans for 2020-2021

NorthStar Academy continues to experience growth. Over the last five years we more than doubled our student population and this year we have increased by 250%. We are now providing anywhere learning to 1850 students! With this explosive growth comes the challenge of finding enough teachers and support staff to take on the work. God has blessed us by sending us 14 new teachers and 5 new support staff who are an excellent fit for our school. With so many new students the staff are exploring a variety of mechanisms to engage with their students such as: Google Hangouts for weekly face to face time, class newsletters, discussion forum check-ins in Moodle, and weekly progress updates.

The number of students with identified learning needs has increased in recent years. We have introduced Learning Support Team meetings for our elementary, junior high, and senior high students and added a support staff member who is working directly with students to encourage and support them.

Our Activity Days program has been refined to offer COVID-19 friendly opportunities to our students. Most activities now involve small groups who follow the safety protocols of the school and the venue we are visiting. Some of our "regular" events have been adapted or cancelled but students are still getting the opportunity to learn and to connect through this program.

We recognized a need to bring our senior high students together to strengthen the sense of community amongst them. "Limitless" has proven to be a successful tool for allowing students to get to know each other and build community. The focus of activities this year has shifted to include service projects such as volunteering at Samaritan's Purse.





Summary of Accomplishments

The NorthStar graduating class of 2020 experienced grad differently this year. COVID-19 prevented us from gathering as a group but students were recognized individually and all received grad gifts to assist them in their post-secondary adventures.

COVID-19 impacted our second semester diploma exams and provincial achievement tests so we do not have information on these two academic sign posts. Historically, our parents clearly appreciate the NSA program as our accountability pillar measures of Safe and Caring, Program of Studies, Education Quality, Work Preparation, Citizenship, Parental Involvement and School Improvement are in the excellent category with all ratings in the high 90's or 100%.

The fall was a particularly busy time for NorthStar as we processed over 1800 registrations, hired additional staff, and wrestled with publishers to get resources out to our students. 2020-2021 has been and looks to continue to be a most interesting year!

Comment on Results

- NSA's diploma exam results have historically been strong for both the acceptable standard and for the standard of excellence for all subjects. The data on high school completion rate varies widely, as does the drop-out rate. This data is not reliable, likely due to the number of part-time students enrolled at NSA.
- The six year transition to post-secondary is lower than the provincial value but many of our students
 are involved in non-traditional post-secondary experiences such as YWAM, Capernwray, and other
 service/leadership programs.
- The percentage of students writing four or more diploma exams is greatly impacted by our high number of part-time students. As well, many home education families are supportive of their children choosing a narrower focus for their secondary education than other families.

Strategies

- We will continue to develop our school's social presence (from the Community of Inquiry framework) by intentionally building student engagement opportunities and strategies into our online courses and by fostering a sense of community and belonging throughout our school as a whole.
- During our monthly PD workshops, we will focus on Powerful Learning by exploring how some specific instructional strategies can be employed within our teaching context.
- All our grade 1-9 teachers will develop their knowledge and skills to foster the implementation of meaningful synchronous online instruction, as mandated by Alberta Education's Online Learning Authority for the 2021-2022 school year.

Comment on Results

NorthStar Academy has too few FNMI students to receive any data on these measures.

Strategies

Our Activity Days have been expanded to include opportunities for students to learn about indigenous peoples and issues. A field study to Blackfoot Crossing Interpretive Center and day of indigenous studies (using a giant map) and soap stone carving have been planned. Staff are also engaging in PD to increase their awareness of the history of FNMI education in the province and its impacts upon students today.

A review of our online resources has identified a paucity of FNMI references and images. Finding and reviewing appropriate resources is a challenging task as most of our staff lack the context for this work. Division office will hopefully be able to provide some advice on how to proceed.
