LITERACY INTERVENTION STRATEGIES

- 1. Look at the pictures. "How can looking at the pictures help you?"
- 2. Look at the rest of the sentence to help you think about this word.
- 3. Make a thinking sound "HMM" and skip over the difficult word. Then come back to it and see if you can figure out the hard word.
- 4. Look at the vowel sound(s) **first**. "This vowel sound says_____, now put that sound in the word. Try it. Put that sound in the word. Say it fast!".
- 5. Use word detective. Look for chunks that you know. (i.e. an ending, root, word family, etc.).
- 6. Look at the beginning, medial, and end sounds (What sounds can you see in the word?).
- 7. Look for little words inside bigger words.
- 8. Look for words that rhyme.
- 9. Look for words that are the same.
- 10. Does the word make sense?
- 11. Does the word look right?
- 12. Does the word sound right?
- 13. How can you figure out this hard word? Where should you look first?

When the student is building (writing) words use the following cues:

- 1. What Sounds Do You Feel?
- 2. How Would You Write That Sound?
- 3. What Can You Hear At The Beginning?
- 4. What Can You Hear/Feel At The End?

NOTE: Articulate carefully letter by letter so the child can hear the particular letter he/she is working on when trying to write words.
