Background

The Division believes strongly in the Charter statement, "Inspiring confident, caring citizens of the world". In keeping with this belief, the Division supports the formation of school/business/community partnerships. Appendix 525A – Strategies for Establishing and Enhancing School/Community Partnerships describes a variety of strategies for establishing and enhancing school/community partnerships.

Procedures

- 1. Principals shall:
 - 1.1 Consult with the School Council, parents, staff and students (when appropriate) in the identification, development and implementation of educational partnerships and sponsorships.
 - 1.2 Inform the Superintendent or designate of any proposed involvement in any educational partnership or sponsorship.
 - 1.3 Forward all educational partnership or sponsorship contracts to the Superintendent or designate for authorized signature.

Strategies For Establishing and Enhancing School/Community Partnerships

Establish A Partnership Committee

Establish a school/community/business partnership committee—brainstorm ideas as a staff in regard to individuals on staff, parents, students, members of the community who would have a significant contribution to make to the committee.

Identify What the Business/Community Has to Offer

Outline what business/community groups have to offer to the school (e.g. assistance in setting up a Young Entrepreneurs Club; job shadowing opportunities; presentations to students and staff in regard to business perspective on education; placements for work experience registered apprenticeship programs).

dentify What the School Has to Offer

Involve students, school staff members and parents in preparing a list of what the school would have to offer through a partnership (assisting businesses in technological applications such as establishing a home page or providing computer training sessions; developing an advertising campaign for business; catering to meetings, organizing and providing leadership for workshops and providing facilities for out-of-school use).

Identify Existing Partnerships

Involve school staff members in a brainstorming session to generate a list of all of the partnerships involving businesses, community organizations and individuals which presently are in place.

Extend An Invitation

Identify some potential partnerships and extend an invitation to attend a function to learn more about what is taking place and to consider potential involvement.

Use the Calgary Educational Partnership Foundations As A Model

Make reference to programs that are available through the Calgary Educational Partnership Foundation and ensure that the opportunities that are made available through the Partnership Foundation are being fully accessed. Consider possible modifications and adaptations that could be used for the benefit of the local school community.

Prepare Students for Involvement in Partnership

Develop a program to prepare students for involvement in partnerships. It is strongly recommended that the Employability Skills Portfolio be used at the junior and senior high school level (e.g. Grade Nine Health and CALM 20). Involve members of the business community in describing basic and special qualities they are looking for in making placements for learning experiences, and in filling job vacancies.

Establish and Enhance School Programs in the Community

Establish and enhance programs involving the school and the community (work experience, integrated occupational program, registered apprenticeship program, job shadowing, storefront schools.



Sometime during the school year organize a function (e.g. breakfast, luncheon or afterschool coffee and donuts—anything involving food) to recognize and celebrate those who are involved in supporting the life and work of the school community through partnerships.
