Strathmore High School requests permission, in accordance with Administrative Procedure 260 and Board Policy 2, for an international high school field trip to Eastern Europe (Berlin, Prague, Krakow and Budapest) from April 8, 2020 to April 19, 2020.

# **Field Excursion Summary:**

- The purpose of the 2020 Europe trip to Eastern Europe is to immerse students in other cultures and to foster a sense of tolerance toward others.
- 91 students (3 grade 10, 28 grade 11, 56 grade 12, 4 other)
- The trip will be 12 days.
- Two days of instructional time will be missed.
- 1 parent for every 1.28 students. 162 people total (91 students/71 adults)
- Trip Itinerary attached.

# Day 2: Berlin

- Meet your Tour Director at the airport in Berlin. Poised at the cutting edge of European culture, this German capital has been transformed since the Berlin Wall fell in 1989. During your stay you'll see Checkpoint Charlie, named after the checkpoint station that once guarded the border between East and West Germany. At the Topography of Terror Museum, on the site of the old SS and Gestapo headquarters, you'll touch the largest piece of the Berlin Wall still standing in its original spot. Stroll past cafes, restaurants and embassies along Unter den Linden, Berlin's most elegant boulevard. Continue to the imposing Reichstag building, the historical seat of Germany's parliament.
- Take a walking tour of Berlin.

From St. Vitus Cathedral to the Baroque statues of the Charles Bridge, you'll explore the celebrated art and architecture of the City of One Hundred Spires.

Now the site of a memorial museum, you can view a film about the horror of Auschwitz and Hitler's Third Reich here. Before you leave, observe a moment of remembrance for the six million victims of the Holocaust.
- Visit Auschwitz and Birkenau.

- Visit Wawel Cathedral.
- Visit St. Mary's Church.

# **VE Day 75: London, Paris & Amsterdam**

April 30, 2020 - May 8, 2020 (May 10 with extension)

What was it like to be a civilian living in a European capital city during the Second World War? To protect your house with sandbags and blackout curtains during the London Blitz, or struggle through daily life watching as your country and countrymen fall to Nazi rule in occupied Holland and France. As you travel through these resilient capitals, explore the different perspectives and difficult decisions of those who faced this reality—living with clothing and food rations, bolstering community morale, and fighting in the resistance against a powerful enemy.

# **Victory in Europe**

May 5, 1945—Nazi forces finally surrender, and Canadian and Allied troops liberate the Netherlands after months of battling to push out the Nazis.

More than seven decades later, the connection forged between Canadians and the Dutch has stayed strong. In May 2020, students and cadets can experience firsthand present-day Dutch culture, and discover for themselves how the unique histories and contributions of the Allied forces continue to influence modern European life and our world today.

Students and cadets become part of history and carry on the legacy of past generations during once-in-a-lifetime commemoration ceremonies and exclusive EF-led events with thousands of fellow Canadians.

# What you'll experience on your tour

April 30, 2020 - May 8, 2020 (May 10 with extension)

#### Day 1: Fly to London

Board your overnight flight to London.

#### Day 2: Arrive in London

Touch down in the capital city of England and the United Kingdom, and meet your Tour Director at the airport. Then, enjoy a walking tour of London and take in the sights and sounds of the city. Afterwards, spend some free time in Borough Market—a market that has existed, in one form or another, for about 1,000 years. In the evening, you have the option to  $\bullet$  ride the London Eye or enjoy a Thames River Cruise.

#### Day 3: London

In the morning, enjoy an expertly guided tour of London with a licensed, local guide. Then, visit Bletchley Park, the central location for British codebreakers during the Second World War. Participate in EF-enhanced programming and learn more about the role communication played in the world of secrets and spies, and how it affected the outcome of the war. In the Cabinet War Rooms, get a glimpse of the life and legacy of Winston Churchill.

#### Day 4: Amsterdam

Take an early morning train to Amsterdam, a city where 1,200 bridges crisscross 160 canals to make it one of Europe's most charming capitals. Enjoy a walking tour of the city where you'll see the Westerkerk (West Church), where Rembrandt is buried. You'll also visit Dam Square, which is home to Koninklijk Paleis (the Royal Palace), before seeing the Flower Market and Jewish Quarter. Then, visit the Dutch Resistance Museum, which tells the story of the Netherlands while it was occupied by Nazi Germany, and the choices, dilemmas, and resistance of the Dutch people.

# Day 5: Amsterdam

Every May 4, the people of the Netherlands participate in a two-minute moment of silence for Remembrance Day. At the VE Day remembrance ceremony at the Groesbeek Canadian War Cemetery, join fellow Canadians and the local community in memorializing those who fell during the Second World War.

# Day 6: Wageningen | Amsterdam

Travel to Wageningen, a historic town along the Rhine river. Here, you'll commemorate Liberation Day—when the Dutch celebrate the end of Nazi occupation and honour freedom, democracy, and human rights. While you're here, you'll be participating in EF-enhanced events surrounding the celebrations.

# Day 7: The Hague | Amsterdam

From Amsterdam, travel to The Hague. Get acquainted with The Hague and learn why it's the "City of International Peace and Justice." Explore the Humanity House, a museum established by the Red Cross to increase awareness of humanitarian issues. There you'll learn about the consequences of conflict, and have an opportunity to reflect on your own personal freedoms. Then, take part in a series of interactive workshops that focus on peace and conflict in the 21st century, created with local experts and the community.

#### Day 8: Brussels | Paris

Transfer to Brussels, a prominent center of international politics and home to the European Union and NATO headquarters. During your visit, you'll pass by the buildings of the European Union, encircled by a row of colourful flags representing the member countries. Continue into the heart of medieval Brussels to see why Victor Hugo dubbed the *Grand-Place* "the most beautiful square in the world." Walk by the ornate façades of the eclectic Guild Houses, a row of tiered buildings that stand shoulder-to-shoulder. Travel from Brussels to Paris.

# Day 9: Paris

Paris was taken by German soldiers in 1940, and its people lived under the Nazi regime until the French uprising and liberation in 1944. Today, Paris is known as the City of Light—a fashion, art, and culinary capital of the world. Get to know Parisian history, from the Louvre to the École Militaire, during an expertly guided sightseeing tour. Enjoy more self-guided exploration of Paris, or  $\bullet$  visit Versailles.



# **OVERVIEW:**

The primary role of Technology Services is to support the technologies used by teachers, staff, and students throughout GHSD, so they can engage in Powerful Learning through ensuring ActivBoards, internet, wireless networks and printing devices are all effective and functioning.


Technology Services continues to be involved in online exam writing. Historically a large emphasis was placed on High School end-of-semester exams, but in the 2018-2019 school year many Junior High and elementary exams were also computer based. Technology Services also maintains all computers, telephones, PA systems, HVAC and other operational technologies.

# **Support Requests**

Technology Services continues to provide technical support to all schools in the division. Requests can be submitted inperson, by telephone, e-mail, remote support, and texting. Most of these support requests are captured through the online ticketing system.

Support requests dropped by 10% in the 2018-2019 school year, whereas in the previous year support requests increased by 13%. The decrease is mostly attributed to new replacement computers for teachers provided towards the end of June 2018.

# **Technical Support Tickets**




# **Bandwidth Charts**

Internet and Wi-Fi are now a necessity in school settings. Technology Services provides Wi-Fi access throughout all buildings and on all school buses, allowing staff and students to be connected. Colony schools are not included. Bandwidth (how much the Internet is used) continues to grow year over year. Internet on school buses is not presented in the chart below.

Internet usage continues to grow. In 2018-2019 year over year Internet growth was approximately 9%. Internet usage varies depending mostly on the size of the student population, with larger schools generally using more Internet capacity.

2018-2019 saw approximately 662 MBps of overall Internet use throughout the school day, across all Golden Hills schools.




# Golden Hills' infrastructure

was specifically designed in a way that is unique in Alberta. This allows GHSD to provide optimum services, with greater cost efficiency than other similarly sized school jurisdictions. Golden Hills continues to rely on the Alberta Supernet, a service that is unique to Alberta in its scale and capacity, and without it there would not be the access necessary in our schools.

# **Wireless Network**

Technology Services provides and maintains a Wi-Fi network across all traditional and online schools, as well as international student dormitories. Access is available 24 hours per day, 7 days per week.

There was a significant increase in the number of wireless devices accessing the infrastructure in 2018-2019, with 21% more devices on the Wi-Fi network than there were a year ago. This is a result of additional devices purchased by the schools, as well as students and staff bringing their own devices from home. The Wi-Fi network is monitored and upgraded as needed in various locations to support this growth.




# **Golden Hills Owned Devices**

ChromeBooks and ChromeOS desktop computers make up more than half of the overall computing systems for staff and students with ChromeBooks being immensely popular at all grade levels. Many ChromeBooks will be retired in 2020 as they have reached the end of their useful life and will need to be replaced.

Technology Services continues to support Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) in GHSD schools and there are more devices on the Wi-Fi network than owned by GHSD. Extra devices

contributing to this are owned by students and staff.



In May 2018, and May 2019 staff computers were replaced as part of the overall technology evergreen strategy. Although schools encourage BYOD, some specific technologies like online exams, are challenging to do in a BYOD environment - especially when many students use a SmartPhone as their device.

# **Aging ActivBoards**

94% of GHSD teachers use ActivBoards as an interactive device every day, compared to other jurisdictions where they are only used in the low 20<sup>th</sup> percentile. This high usage means that when there is a technical issue with an ActivBoard, it is one of the highest priorities for the Technology Services support team.

The first major challenge with aging equipment came in late August 2019. Microsoft released an update that effectively broke more than 25% of existing ActivBoards. Promethean has provided a temporary fix, but it will not be supported for any future updates and they are recommending that they be replaced. Approximately 153 ActivBoards will need to be replaced within the next 12 months and approximately another 150 ActivBoards will need to be replaced in the next two years.

An evaluation process to review what replacement technologies would be the best fit in GHSD classrooms is underway.

# Notable:

Division Office Renovation / Temporary Re-location

In March 2019 temporary Division Office work space needed to be set up at George Freeman School during renovations. This included setting up copiers and moving all phones and computers to the temporary space. Technology and Transportation shared a classroom, as did Finance/Payroll and Human Resources, in classrooms that were never intended to house that much technology, infrastructure and people. Once renovations of Division Office were complete in mid-August, everything was moved back and set up. Although this coincided with school startup which is one of the busiest times of the year for Technology Services, all tasks related to the move were completed smoothly. This did cause normal school year startup tasks to fall behind, and it was mid-November 2019 before these tasks began to be completed.

# Imagine Everything

In 2018-2019 GHSD entered into a partnership with a company called Imagine Everything. This small group works directly with K-12 school jurisdictions to design software to meet specific needs. Currently GHSD uses their Student Audit product which has provided tremendous value. In early 2020 GHSD will pilot their CLASI product, which will be an extraordinary help in bringing digital files into Alberta Education's PASI repository.

# Aging ChromeBooks

ChromeBooks are immensely popular and valuable within our schools, and there are mobile carts filled with ChromeBooks that are used in every classroom. ChromeBooks have a limited lifespan of 3-4 years but are significantly less expensive than a desktop computer. Because of their low-cost, schools have made more of these available for

students than ever before. For example, ten years ago a school of 400 students might have a single computer lab with 30 computers. Now the same school will likely have four to six or more carts of 30 ChromeBooks. Although there is more access than ever before, it is a significant increase of cost in both capital costs and technical support.

# Increased Dependence on Technology

Technology use is always increasing throughout GHSD. Communication with parents, access to student marks, providing a safe environment through security, access to learning in every space, telephones and PA systems are all primarily online. Teachers are incredibly creative and innovative and are continually pushing the envelope for the benefit of their students. It is only when these technologies fail that it's realized just how much they are depended on. Technology Services is aware of this challenge, and a priority focus is ensuring stability, backup, and that the technology will work even when problems occur.

An example is the GHSD Disaster Recovery site. Technology Services continues to work on technology so that when something happens to the main data center in Strathmore, many things automatically fall over to the disaster recovery site, with the expectation that teachers and students can continue to work uninterrupted.

# **SUMMARY & IMPLICATIONS:**

The use of varying technologies within Golden Hills continually evolves and expands. Technology Services will continue to look for ways to enhance the use of technology in schools, while being efficient and effective in how it is supported.

# ALBERTA SCHOOL BOARDS INSURANCE EXCHANGE (ASBIE)

# **Background:**

Alberta School Boards Insurance Exchange Program (ASBIE) was created on January 1, 2003. Golden Hills has been a member since inception.

Currently there are 48 school boards and 300 other school related organizations who are members as part of this reciprocal.

In May of 2019, we were advised that premiums for 19/20 were reduced and our group was receiving a total of \$1M in shared refunds.

In August of 2019, we were advised rates were increasing and in October, we were told rates were doubling, and then late October we were advised they were tripling.

Clearly, the extraordinary premium increases were unanticipated and has resulted in an additional cost to our Board of just under \$1M. We are continuing to explore all our current and future options.

We have given our notice to withdraw from ASBIE effective October 31, 2020.
